## Important Information

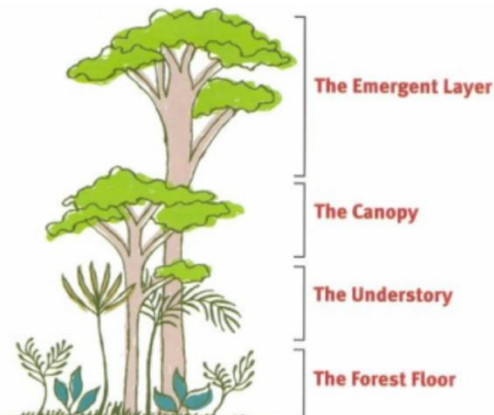
**Plot:** Where the wild things are is the story of a little boy and main character of the story, named Max. After his mother sends him to bed without dinner, Max falls asleep and his room immediately transforms into a moonlit forest surrounded by a vast ocean.

**Themes:** Friendship, imagination

**Setting:** Max's bedroom

As part of our Topic work we will also be learning about rainforests.

There are **two types**: Temperate and Tropical  
The **largest** tropical rainforest in the world is the **Amazon** rainforest in South America.  
A rainforest has four layers.

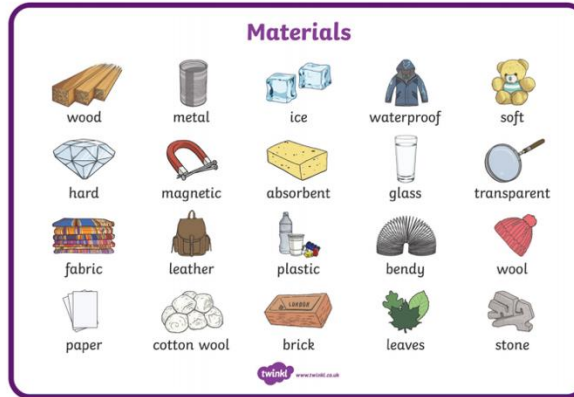
In Science we will be looking at materials and their properties. As part of our science work we will be designing and making our own wild things character.

# Materials

## CHALLENGE:

Can you find things made from different materials around your house? What are they made from? What properties do they have?



## Art

In Art we will be looking at the different illustrations in the book. Imagine a forest grew in your bedroom. What would it look like?



## DT

In DT we will be designing and making our own wild things characters. What materials do you think we could use?

<b>Deciduous</b>	A tree or plant that drops its leaves in Autumn
<b>Coniferous</b>	A tree or plant that keeps its leaves all year (sometimes referred to as <b>Evergreen.</b> )
<b>Rainforest</b>	A dense forest mainly found in tropical areas with heavy rainfall
<b>Temperate</b>	Mild temperatures, neither too hot or too cold
<b>Tropical</b>	An area that is very hot
<b>Equator</b>	The imaginary line in the centre of the earth that divides the northern and southern hemispheres
<b>Amazon</b>	An area in South America
<b>Deforestation</b>	The action of clearing a wide area of trees
<b>Vegetation</b>	Plants found in a particular area or habitat.
<b>Climate</b>	The weather conditions in an area in general or over a long period.
